Stay safe during aevere winter weather



When severe winter weather hits, power outages can occur, and roadways can be dangerous. Now is the time to prepare for the next severe winter storm.

Prepare your home: Weatherproof your home by sealing air leaks. Inspect chimney flues for wood stoves or wood-burning fireplaces. Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on each floor of your home. Protect pipes from freezing. Have enough nonperishable food, water, and medical supplies/medicines for 72 hours. Also have these items ready: a first-aid kit, a flashlight and batteries, a phone charger, hand sanitizer, blankets, and warm clothing.

Prepare your vehicle: Complete annual maintenance, test the car battery and cooling system, use winter tires and replace them if the tread is less than 2/32 of an inch, check tire pressure and wiper blades, add wiper fluid rated for less than minus 30 degrees, and keep the gas tank at least half full.

In addition, consider an emergency kit for your vehicle. According to *Consumer Reports*, it can be less expensive to buy a prepared emergency kit than to purchase items individually. A kit typically includes battery booster cables, an ice scraper, a portable shovel, flashlights, a signaling cone, backup batteries for the flashlight, roadside triangles, a reflective vest, a basic first-aid kit, and a cell phone charger.

Stock your vehicle with gloves, a blanket, a rain poncho, wipes, rags, boots, and a hat. It cannot hurt to also have bottled water and nonperishable snacks in your vehicle in case you become stranded.


When Mother Nature threatens a severe storm, be ready by having an emergency kit on hand.

Fight the winter chill and save energy

While some people love crisp, cool weather, others prefer the warm temperatures summer brings.

But there's one thing we can all agree on: high winter bills are never fun. Franklin REC is here to help you find ways to manage your energy use and keep winter bills in check.

Here are five tips to help increase your home's energy efficiency this winter:

- Mind the thermostat. We recommend setting your thermostat to 68 degrees (or lower) when you're home.
 When you're sleeping or away, try setting it between 58 and 62 degrees.
- 2. Button up your home. Caulking and weather stripping around windows and doors is another simple, cost-effective way to increase comfort and save energy.

- 3. Use window coverings wisely.

 Open window coverings during the day to allow in natural sunlight to warm your home. Close them at night to keep the cold, drafty air out.
- 4. Consider your approach to appliance use. Assess how efficiently you're using your appliances. For example, if you're running the dishwasher or clothes washer, only wash full loads.
- 5. Think outside the box. If you're still feeling chilly at home, add layers of clothing, wear thick socks, and bundle up under blankets. If you have hard-surface flooring, consider an area rug.

When running space heaters, keep in mind that on average, running two 1,500-watt space heaters for eight hours can add almost \$100 to your monthly power bill.

Safety Tip

Heating equipment accounts for 13% of home fires. Place a space heater on a hard surface and make sure clothing, papers and other combustible items are at least 3 feet away from the heater.





Franklin REC employees continue to be servant leaders. In October, a number of Franklin REC employees cleaned up the ditches along Highway 3 as part of their commitment to community.
